“Blessed are they who mourn.” What better way to show the upside-down reality than through slavery, man’s total disregard for the sanctity of all human life? The second half of the beatitude continues, “for they shall be comforted.” Pope Benedict wrote of two kinds of mourning: the first is the kind that loses hope, the kind that eats away and destroys man from within. But the second is “the mourning occasioned by the shattering encounter with truth, which leads man to undergo conversion and to resist evil.” (Jesus of Nazareth, p. 86) The second beatitude is symbolized by the life of Saint Peter Claver (*on the cover*). His story is remarkable and moving. The historic reality of chattel slavery is one of the worst stains upon the western hemisphere, and Peter Claver’s work amongst those emerging from the hulls of slave ships earned him the respect and admiration of countless people in 16th century Columbia.

The Saint is holding a cross, his arm extended in gesture of blessing. On the left side, one can see the flowing waters of baptism, as Saint Peter is said to have baptized nearly 300,000 slaves in the course of his ministry. Six are pictured on one side of the window, bowing their heads as they prepare to receive the life-giving Sacrament. But Peter Claver also knew that he must first feed people’s bodies, and he holds in his arms a basket of food. Waiting in the port, Peter Claver would immediately enter an arriving ship and head down to the hull. There he would distribute whatever he had been able to acquire through begging– bread, fresh fruit (so many died of scurvy caused by a deficiency of Vitamin C) and even sweets.

Unusually, the window also depicts a cruel slave owner, poised to unleash his whip upon any unruly subjects. On the right side of the window may be found the society women of Cartagena, who too often chided the saint for caring too much about the slaves, and not others. I suspect that his ministry pricked their dull consciences! But truth be told, it was the leading women and men of society whom Peter made so uncomfortable! The expression on their faces is one of exasperation, perhaps in part because when Saint Peter Claver visited the slaves whom he baptized, he did not stay in the quarters of the plantation owners, but went directly to those whom he had baptized. He called himself “Slave of the slaves of God.”

Deacon Let us pray that contemplating Jesus, our Lord and our Peace, Christians will be able to repent of the words and attitudes caused by pride, by hatred, by the desire to dominate others, by enmity towards members of other religions and towards the weakest groups in society, such as immigrants and itinerants.

Archbishop Lord of the world, Father of all, through your Son you asked us to love our enemies, to do good to those who hate us and to pray for those who persecute us. Yet Christians have often denied the Gospel; yielding to a mentality of power, they have violated the rights of ethnic groups and peoples and shown contempt for their cultures and religious traditions. Be patient and merciful towards us, and grant us your forgiveness! We ask this through Christ our Lord.

III. CONFESSION OF SINS AGAINST THE UNITY OF THE HUMAN RACE

Deacon Let us pray for all those who have suffered offences against their human dignity and whose rights have been trampled.

Silent prayer.

Archbishop Lord God, our Father, you created the human being, man and woman, in your image and likeness and you willed the diversity of peoples within the unity of the human family. At times, however, the equality of your sons and daughters has not been acknowledged, and Christians have been guilty of attitudes of rejection and exclusion, consenting to acts of discrimination on the basis of racial and ethnic differences. Forgive us and grant us the grace to heal the wounds still present in your community on account of sin, so that we will all feel ourselves to be your sons and daughters. We ask this through Christ our Lord.

IV. CONFESSION OF SINS OF PERSONAL RACIAL PREJUDICE

Deacon Let us pray that we may all reject racial stereotypes, racial slurs and racial jokes in our thinking and our conversations; and that we might manifest sensitivity to the authentic human values and cultural contributions of each racial grouping in our country.

Silent prayer.

Cantor Kyrie eleison. Christe eleison. Kyrie eleison.

Archbishop Compassionate God, fill our hearts with humility before you and solidarity with all other human beings. Cleanse our minds of false stereotypes of those who differ from us in race or ethnic heritage. Help us to welcome the stranger and the immigrant as brothers and sisters in the one human race. Help us to recognize in all people the presence of your Son, Jesus, who declared that he was to be found especially in the poor and needy. We ask this through Christ our Lord.

V. CONFESSION OF SINS OF RACIAL PREJUDICE WITHIN THE CHURCH

Deacon Let us pray that the members of the Church will examine their consciences regarding their attitudes and behaviors toward Blacks, Latinx, Native Americans and Asians. Let us ask pardon for Christian religious institutions who benefited from slavery. May we repudiate all that relegates our brothers and sisters to second-class citizenship in the Church.

Silent prayer.

Cantor Kyrie eleison. Christe eleison. Kyrie eleison.

Archbishop God of justice, the difficulties of these new times demand a new vision and a renewed courage to transform our Church. May we recognize and reject past instances of racial mistreatment and abuse, intended or unintended, by our Catholic institutions and by our members. Help us to strive for the goal of racial justice with determination and creativity in solidarity with all people of good will. We ask this through Christ our Lord.

VI. CONFESSION OF SINS OF RACIAL PREJUDICE IN LARGER SOCIETY

Deacon Let us pray that racial differences not interfere with our dealing justly and peacefully with all other nations; and that those nations which possess more of the world's riches share, in justice, with those who are in serious need.

Cantor Kyrie eleison. Christe eleison. Kyrie eleison.

Archbishop God of all the nations, we confess that institutional or structural racism is embedded in the systems and institutions of society, wherever such systems and institutions are created and maintained in such a way that they provide privilege or prejudice for one race over others. Give us conversion of heart that we pledge ourselves to preserve and defend the rights and dignity of all people, no matter what their race or ethnic heritage is. Through our enthusiastic and prudent cooperation with your Spirit, transform our social, economic, and political structures so that they may more clearly enshrine your vision and will for all people. We ask this through Christ our Lord.

VII. CONFESSION OF SINS AGAINST CHILDREN

Deacon Let us pray for all children who have been neglected, cast off, or even killed because of their racial or ethnic heritage.

Send a spirit of repentance and welcome into our hearts that we may provide a home of safety and love for every child and preserve them from infection by sins of racism, selfishness, or egotism. We ask this through Christ our Lord.

And he shall rule victorious O'er all the world's domain.


